

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Day 7	Stratford / Coventry (B,D)	"In state
	Breakfast at the hotel, followed by check-out Take a tour of the Shakespeare properties in Stratford. Start with the half- timbered house that is Shakespeare's Birthplace. The house itself is part museum and part shrine. Also, visit the Church of the Holy Trinity, which occupies a truly magical setting amongst some trees next to the river. Shakespeare is buried on the north side of the chancel Lunch, on own	
	Continue to Coventry with <i>(time permitting)</i> a stop at Coventry Cathedral. The Cathedral was constructed in the late 14th century and stood for centuries as one of the largest parish churches in England. During WWII, Coventry Cathedral fell victim to the brutal Nazi Blitz in November 1940, and was almost completely destroyed. Only the spire, outer wall, and the tomb of the first Bishop of the Cathedral survived the attack. The decision to "rebuild in hope, not defiance" was made the next day, and the modern cathedral was completed next to the ruins of the original Cathedral in 1962 Dinner included, and overnight	
	Stratford-upon-Avon, one of the most famous towns in England, is situated on the west bank of the River Avon, in the heart of the Midlands. It dates to at least Roman times, but its appearance today is that of a small Tudor market town, with mellow, half-timbered architecture and tranquil walks beside the tree-fringed Avon. This image belies its popularity as the most visited tourist attraction outside London, with eager hordes flocking to see buildings connected to William Shakespeare or his descendants	
Day 8	Oxford / London (B,D)	
	Breakfast at the hotel, followed by check-out Take a visit to Christ Church College. With its compelling combination of majestic architecture, literary heritage and double identity as (parts of) Harry Potter's Hogwarts, Christ Church attracts tourists galore. Among Oxford's largest colleges – the largest if you include its meadow – and proud possessor of its most impressive quad, plus a superb art gallery and even a cathedral, it was founded in 1525 by Cardinal Wolsey. 	The famous university city of Oxford is found North West of London, on the north bank of the River Thames. Oxford University is the oldest in England, dating from around 1200. The city itself was developed in Saxon times around the 8th century nunnery, now Christ Church, and still maintains its original street plan and parts of its city walls
